THIRD READING AND ORDINANCE NO. 1106 ADOPTED EXTENDING THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF WORTHINGTON TO INCLUDE 29 ACRES OF UNPLATTED LAND ABUTTING THE CITY OF WORTHINGTON, NOBLES COUNTY, MINNESOTA AND OWNED BY SOUTH SHORE ACRES, LLC.

Pursuant to published notice this was the time and date set for the third reading of a proposed ordinance that would annex 29 acres of unplatted land abutting the city of Worthington owned by South Shore Acres, LLC, legally described as:

That part of Government Lot 5 and the Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 26, Township 102, Range 40, Worthington Township, Nobles County, Minnesota, lying southeasterly of the southeasterly right of way line of the Chicago and North Western Railroad and being more particularly described as follows:

# SECOND READING PROPOSED ORDINANCE PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT - SIX FAIRWAY VIEW

Pursuant to published notice, this was the time and date set for the second reading of a proposed ordinance that would rezone the following legally described property from its current R-4 Medium Density Residential and Natural Features to Planned Unit Development:

Commencing at the Northwest corner of said Section 22; thence North 89 degrees 50 minutes

Thence continuing South 00 degrees 15 minutes 59 seconds East, a distance of 508.00 feet; thence southerly, along said easterly highway right-of way line, a distance of 693.43 feet along a tangential circular curve concave to the west having a radius of 1482.40 feet and a central angle of 26 degrees 48 minutes 05 seconds to a found iron survey marker at the northerly most corner of the Homestead Cooperative of Worthington tract; thence South 63 degrees 27 minutes 54 seconds East, along the north line of said Homestead Cooperative of Worthington tract and its easterly extension, a distance of 320.33 feet; thence North 05 degrees 01 minutes 47 seconds West, a distance of 487.22 feet; thence northerly, parallel with said curve and easterly highway right-of-way line, a distance of 329.63 feet through a central angle of 11 degrees 47 minutes 11 seconds; thence North 00 degrees 15 minutes 59 seconds West, tangent to said curve and parallel with said easterly highway right-of-way line, a distance of 559.57 feet to the southerly highway right-of-way line of said C.S.A.H. No. 35; thence South 88 degrees 59 minutes 20 seconds West, along said southerly highway right-of-way line, a distance of 70.01 feet to a point on said southerly highway right-of-way line being 50.00 feet east of the easterly highway right-of-way line of said C.S.A.H. No. 10; thence South 44 degrees 21 minutes 41 seconds West, a distance of 71.17 feet to the point of beginning.

Thomas Walsh Jr. And GL Development MN LLC is seeking rezoning of the property for a residential development along the east side of North Crailsheim Drive and immediately south of Oxford Street.

The motion was made by Council Member Harmon, seconded by Council Member Ernst and unanimously carried to give a second reading to the proposed ordinance.

# <u>CONTINUATION OF NOBLES HOME INITIATIVE TAX ABATEMENT PROGRAM</u> THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2022 APPROVED WITH CONTINGENCY

Council considered a revised copy of the Nobles Home Initiative Guidelines, which would continue the program through December 31, 2022. Steve Robinson, City Administrator, noted the revision was a minor typo change and was based on review and discussion by the administrators of Nobles County, ISD 518 and the City of Worthington. To-date, Nobles County has considered and approved 50 applications, and 20 of those have been in the city of Worthington. The current Nobles Home Initiative Program expires December 31, 2017. Mr. Robinson noted approval should be contingent on approval from ISD 518 and Nobles County.

The motion was made by Council Member Oberloh, seconded by Council Member Janssen and

unanimously carried to approve continuation of the Nobles Home Initiative Tax Abatement Program through December 31, 2022, subject to approval by the County and the School District.

# <u>PURCHASE AGREEMENT WITH PBK REAL ESTATE, LLC APPROVED FOR PARCEL</u> 31-3786-551

Council considered a new purchase agreement with PBK Real Estate, LLC, for Parcel 31-3786-551 an approximate 1.1 acre tract north of the Comfort Suites Hotel. The purchase price as presented in the agreement was \$77,924, with closing to take place on or before November 1, 2017. The agreement was prepared by the City Attorney. Council Member Oberloh stated that the value of the lot is \$104,790 - the price was originally reduced to the \$77,924 when the property was to be sold but with restrictions - what if they don't build, why would we leave \$30,000 on the table. Purnet paid \$2.08 per square foot for their property there.

The motion was made by Council Member Oberloh and seconded by Council Member Janssen to approve the purchase agreement but at the purchase price of \$104,790.

Council Member Ernst said she also had issue with this - we've met with them a couple of times and we have conditions on what they are going to have done by a certain date and that has not come to fruition. She understands why the conditions are being removed in this contract, but didn't think she necessarily agreed with it. Council Member Oberloh explained that the City Attorney's opinion was that the conditions would be hard to enforce if they didn't complete by their time-line or do what they said they were going to do with the sale - then we would have the expense of trying to get the property back. This would be an outright sale to them at the appraised price. Council Member Ernst said she did not disagree at all with Council Member Oberloh regarding the purchase price. Council Member Janssen asked if they had agreed to this. Steve Robinson, City Administrator, responded they had agreed to the purchase price of \$77,924, but this agreement needed to go back to them for approval. Council Member Janssen agreed that we should ask for the appraised value.

The motion was unanimously carried.

# BURNING PERMIT APPROVED FOR MINNESOTA WEST COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE WITH CONTINGENCY

Gordon Heitkamp, on behalf of Minnesota West Community and Technical College, had submitted an application for a Burning Permit to allow a maintenance burn on their pollinator/outdoor classroom plot. The application was reviewed and approved by Fire Chief Rick Von Holdt as required by City Code.

The motion was made by Council Member Oberloh to move approval with a comment before the vote.

Council Member Cummings asked if, with the approval of Rick Von Holdt, would this be a

controlled burn - supervised? Council Member Oberloh responded that he had visited with Mr. Heitkamp over the weekend and requested that the fire department be on-site for the burn. Mr. Heitkamp was okay with that request and said they would also pay for fire department presence if necessary.

Council Member Oberloh amended his motion to include that the fire department would be on-site for the burn. The motion was seconded by Council Member Cummings and unanimously carried.

# RESOLUTION NO. 2017-09-16 ADOPTED AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF GRANT APPLICATION FOR PHASE II FEMA HAZARD MITIGATION FUNDING

Dwayne Haffield, Director of Engineering, reminded Council that FEMA funding for Phase I of the County Ditch 12 flood mitigation project was awarded a year ago. The City has been informed that the Benefit Cost Analysis and other required information complete in Phase I has been reviewed by FEMA, and that a Phase 2 application should be submitted. Mr. Haffield cautioned that this means the project has been found to be eligible for the funding, but the Phase 2 grant is not assured - it appears that what we've done to date has been satisfactory. They'll want us to go through the formal review process now to see if a grant offer can be made, but FEMA staff have pretty much all been pulled down to the south and southwest. We don't expect an answer in the next few weeks by any means.

The application represents about \$40,000 less in funding than talked about earlier this year, but is still in the realm of what they had rounded it off to be: \$2.5 million Federal and \$1.8 million local share. It is a 75/25 grant but it's based on the funds they have. Staff was seeking authorization to submit the application and the two letters of commitment that go with it stating that we will cover the local share and agree to maintain it through the life of the facility. It does not commit us to having to accept the grant when it's offered. The financing plan was to bond for a little over a million and use about \$750,000 of reserves from the storm water utility fund. Mr. Haffield said that could still be tweaked. In response to a question from Mayor Kuhle, Mr. Haffield said there would not be enough coming into reserves in the future to service the bonds so there will be some rate adjustments required. We have one more rate adjustment we need to talk about for this year - staff is projecting that, from today, we'll still have to be up 10 to 12 percent, depending on the bond amount, and interest rates could vary. That's the kind of rate increase we would see just to cover the debt service. The schedule for the project is still a concern - we would hope for a grant offer this winter and go to construction next year and be completed by the end of 2019.

The motion was made by Council Member Oberloh, seconded by Council Member Janssen and unanimously carried to adopt the following Resolution authorizing execution of the grant application and authorizing the Mayor to sign the two letters of commitment:

# **Approval of Minutes**

Amy Ernst made a motion to approve the minutes from the September 5, 2017 meeting. Chris Kielblock seconded the motion at it unanimously passed.

# <u>Public Hearing and Recommendation to City Council</u> Conditional Use Permit - SMOC

Staff reviewed a Conditional Use Permit application submitted by Southwest MN Opportunity Council (SMOC), which if approved, would allow the applicant to construct and operate a child care facility (Head Start) on property currently owned by Worthington ISD 518. The proposed 14,000 square foot childcare facility would provide early childhood education for 140 preschool aged children operated by 35 staff members. Child care facilities are permitted in the R-1 district, which is the zoning classification of the subject property, through the issuance of a conditional use permit. After review of the submitted site plan, staff noted that discussion had taken place regarding the delivery truck entrance also being used as the school bus entrance.

Bob Bristow opened the public hearing. Neal Steffl, Executive Director for SMOC, addressed the delivery truck entrance being used by buses by stating deliveries were not very frequent for the Head Start facility so he felt that buses also using that driveway would be acceptable.

Terry Rotschafer, a neighboring property owner, spoke against the approval of the requested conditional use permit stating his concerns were the increase in traffic along Pleasant Avenue and the safety of pedestrians due to the proximity of the proposed northerly driveway and Pleasant Park. Mr. Rotschafer stated he did not feel the commercial nature of the proposed use was appropriate for the residential neighborhood. Mr. Rotschafer noted that his other concerns were increased noise as well as water collecting and flowing down Pleasant Avenue with the increase of impervious surface after construction of the building. Staff explained that roughly 90% of the children attending Head Start

would be using the buses so there was no anticipation of a lot of cars dropping kids off. Staff also explained that a rain garden would be placed at the front of the property to address the impervious surface issues.

Ron Drent also expressed his concern over the increased traffic in the neighborhood. Mr. Drent also felt that the value of his property would decrease. He also added that he was not opposed to a new Head Start facility but felt there must be a better suited location elsewhere.

Lee Hain stated he was also concerned about what the increase in traffic would do to the park goers. He added that he felt having a truck entrance that close to park is not safe and a lot of people use that park on a regular basis, including a neighborhood daycare. Mr. Hain asked if the exterior of the proposed building would be brick. Neal Steffl explained that the type of material has not yet been decided but they did know it would not be brick.

Calvin Rehborg added that he too was concerned about the increase in traffic volume as well as the disruption caused to an otherwise quiet neighborhood. He also felt that the value of his property would decrease.

Alan Oberloh believed the parking requirements were not strict enough and that on street parking was not a good idea. Mr. Oberloh questioned future growth and whether or not the proposed site would accommodate growth.

In response to questions from the Commission, Neal Steffl explained that only 25 of the 140 students used the facility year round. He also explained how there was no room left for expansion because the parking lot is maxed out for the size of the lot and the Head Start program is only funded to serve a set amount.

Chris Kielblock motioned to close the public hearing. Amy Ernst seconded the motion and it unanimously passed.

Additional discussion took place. Neal Steffl explained that a second driveway was added to prevent vehicles from backing out into Pleasant Avenue. Mr. Steffl added that 34 kids attend full days with 106 attending for ½ a day and those attending ½ days are split between morning and afternoon classes which should also reduce traffic flow.

Amy Ernst made a motion to recommend approval of the conditional use permit based on the case item considerations with the conditions:

- 1. Maintain compliance with all federal and state laws, rules and regulations.
- 2. Improvements are done in accordance with the application, the plans submitted as revised, (Site Plan #765.01 dated 9-28-2017).
- 3. Detailed Stormwater Management Plan approved by the City Engineer and DNR to allow for greater than 25% impervious coverage.
- 4. Incorporate and maintain not less than 5 trees evenly spaced in the rain garden along Pleasant Avenue.

Chris Kielblock seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. Annette Fielder stated the decision of the Planning Commission would be forwarded to City Council for consideration at their October 9<sup>th</sup>, 2017 meeting.

# <u>Public Hearing and Recommendation to City Council</u> <u>Conditional Use Amendment</u>

Worthington ISD 518 is requesting to amend their original conditional use permit to remove 2 tracts of land which will reflect parts that have been or are going to be developed. The first of the 2 tracts is the property for the Headstart facility and is contigent upon aproval of a CUP for Headstart to be permited as a child care conditional use. The second is now part of the LDS church site in the NE corner of First Avenue SW and Knollwood Drive which was not removed when the church was granted a CUP and can be corrected at this time.

Bob Bristow opened the public hearing. With no comments from the public Chris Kielblock made a motion to close the public hearing. Amy Ernst seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. With no further discussion, Chris Kielblock made a motion to recommend approval of the conditional use permit amendment, with the tract along Pleasant Avenue contingent upon approval of the Conditional Use Permit for the child care facility. The motion was seconded by Amy Ernst and passed unanimously.

Due to Election Day falling on the first Tuesday in November the next Planning Commission meeting will be held on Monday, November 6 at 7:00 p.m.

- **Section 3.** That the City Clerk of the City of Worthington is hereby directed to file the assessment roll pertaining to this assessment in the Office of the City Clerk; and shall certify annually to the County Auditor of said Nobles County, Minnesota, on or before the 30th day of November of each year, the total amount of installment and interest which are to become due in the following year on the assessment on each parcel of land included in the assessment roll, which shall be extended on the proper tax lists of said county and are to be collected and paid over in the same manner as other municipal taxes of said city.
- **Section 4.** That the owner of any property as herein assessed for said improvement may, at any time prior to November 15, 2017, pay to the City of Worthington Assessment Clerk the whole of said assessment on such property, with interest at the rate of four and nine-tenths per cent (4.9%) per annum accrued to the date of payment, except that no interest shall be charged if the entire assessment is paid within thirty (30) days from the adoption of the

assessment. The owner of any property as herein assessed may thereafter pay to the County Treasurer of said county, the installment and interest that is in the process of collection on the current tax lists, and may pay to the City of Worthington Assessment Clerk the remaining balance of the assessment. Such payment must be made before November 15th or interest will be charged through December 31st of the next succeeding year. Partial prepayments may also be made in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 952.

## 1. <u>CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT - SOUTHWEST MINNESOTA OPPORTUNITY</u> COUNCIL - CHILD CARE FACILITY

**A. Background**: On Tuesday October 3, 2017, the Worthington Planning Commission held a public hearing regarding a Conditional Use Permit request by SMOC to construct and operate a Child Care facility (Headstart) on land currently owned by the Worthington ISD #518, located on Pleasant Street. If the Conditional Use permit is approved, the School would need to complete platting of the property before the property could be transferred to SMOC. This Conditional Use permit is tied to Case item #2 Conditional Use - Amendment for Worthington ISD #518. The legal description of the subject property is as follows:

PART OF THE SOUTHEAST QUARTER OF SECTION 27, TOWNSHIP 102 NORTH, RANGE 40 WEST IN THE CITY OF WORTHINGTON, WORTHINGTON TOWNSHIP, NOBLES COUNTY, MINNESOTA, DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:

THE TRACT CONTAINS 3.1 ACRES AND IS SUBJECT TO EXISTING EASEMENTS OF RECORD, IF ANY.

**B.** Planning Commission Findings of Fact: The Planning Commission reviewed the request for a permit which was filed with fee and detailed written and graphic material; a hearing was held and the Commission considered heard public comment and considered possible adverse effects of the proposed conditional use as well as what additional requirements may be necessary to reduce adverse effects. During the hearing, comments expressed by the public included: traffic, safety, the park, water retention, sufficient off street parking, and property values.

The Planning Commission based their recommendation upon the Findings of Fact consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and the Zoning Ordinance and cited the items in the Planning Commission Case item 1, Considerations as amended as their findings. Specifically, for Zoning Consideration items 1, 2, 3, and 5; Comprehensive Plan (Consistency with Plan, Move to Plan Vision, and Consistent with Plan Policies) Consideration item 4.

The information provided in Exhibit 1 (Planning Commission Case item), has been updated / corrected, which is reflected in italics. The Planning Commission Case Item information includes the complete application including site plan and layout (Exhibit 1A), a map identifying the location of the project (Exhibit 1B, (Exhibit 1C, Table 5, Zoning Ordinance Schedule of Uses; Map of the West Residential District from the Comprehensive Plan; and the Framework for Community Development (Exhibit 1E). Evidence of the public input is provided in the draft Planning Commission Minutes in your packet. While staff requested consideration for the delivery truck entrance to also include access for the four Headstart buses, the Planning Commission declined that recommendation based on public concern of traffic and safety for children accessing the park north of the proposed site.

- **C. Planning Commission Recommendation**: The Worthington Planning Commission recommends to the City Council that they approve the Conditional Use Permit with the following condition(s):
  - 1. Improvements are done in accordance with the application, the plans submitted as revised with the application and included with this Case Item (Site Plan # 765.01 dated 9-28-2017 Exhibit 1A).
  - 2. Detailed Stormwater Management Plan approved by the City Engineer and DNR to allow for greater than 25% impervious coverage.
  - 3. Incorporate and maintain not less than 5 trees evenly spaced in the rain garden along Pleasant Street.
- \* In addition, the approval of this CUP would be contingent upon the approval of amending the Prairie Elementary Conditional Use Permit to remove this property from the existing

Conditional Use Permit.

## 2. SCHOOL DISTRICT CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT AMENDMENT REQUEST

- **A. Background**: On Tuesday October 3, 2017, the Worthington Planning Commission held a public hearing regarding a Conditional Use Permit amendment request by the Worthington ISD #518School District to remove two tracts from their original CUP, which will reflect parts that have or are to be developed differently from the original CUP. This Conditional Use permit is tied to Case item #1 Conditional Use SMOC for a Child Care facility.
- **B.** Findings of Fact: The Planning Commission based their recommendation upon the following information: Exhibit 2 Planning Commission Case item which included considerations, Exhibit 2A the legal description in the original CUP; Exhibit 2A page 2 the legal description of the Tract 1 (under consideration for a CUP under case item 1), Exhibit 2B Tract 2 and is to be removed from the Original CUP; Exhibit 2C a map of the two areas under consideration; and Public Comment (none), please refer to draft Planning Commission minutes.
- **C. Planning Commission Recommendation**: The Worthington Planning Commission recommends to the City Council that they approve the Conditional Use Permit amendment for ISD #518 by removing the following tracts of land as follows:
  - Tract 1: referred to as the area for the proposed Headstart facility along Pleasant Avenue, and is contingent upon Council approval of a CUP for the Child Care. The legal description is provided in Exhibit 2B in and the east side of said property borders Pleasant Avenue.
  - Tract 2: is now part of the Church site in the NE corner of 1st Ave SW and Knollwood Drive which was not removed when the church was granted a CUP and can be correct at this time. The legal description is provided in Exhibit 2B.

# PUBLIC HEARING AND RECOMMENDATION TO CITY COUNCIL Conditional Use Permit - Southwest Minnesota Opportunity Council – Child Care Facility

A. Background: Southwest Minnesota Opportunity Council is seeking the issuance of a conditional use permit for property owned by Worthington ISD #518, located on Pleasant Street (Exhibit 1A). If approved, the applicant will be permitted to operate a child care facility (Headstart) on the subject property. The capacity of the facility would be 140 children, and be operated by 35 staff. Headstart provides early child hood education for preschool aged children and parent education for the guardians. The applicant is proposing to construct a facility, up to 14,000 square foot. Child Care facilities are permitted in the "R-1" – Residential Single Family Detached zoning district, which is the zoning classification of the subject property, through the issuance of a conditional use permit. Exhibit 1B provides a view of the footprint of the area for the CUP. The legal description of the subject property is as follows:

## **B.** Considerations:

- 1. Title XV, Chapter 155: Zoning, Appendix E. Table 5. Schedule of Uses of the Worthington MN Code represents land uses that are permitted, not permitted, or permitted by Conditional Use. As previously motioned, the property is zoned "R-1" Residential Single Family Detached, and Child Care is allowed as a Conditional Use (Exhibit 1C).
- Minnesota Administrative Rules Chapter 9503, Child Care Center Licensing is under the
  auspices of the Minnesota Department of Human Services which dictates all facets of
  the size, space, and operation requirements of said facility
  <a href="https://www.revisor.mn.gov/rules/?id=9503">https://www.revisor.mn.gov/rules/?id=9503</a>, and federal Headstart standards; as well
  as the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources requirements for impervious
  surface coverage.
- 3. The area under consideration is in the Shoreland Overlay District and as such is limited to impervious coverage requirements. Play areas outside of the classrooms will be

- designed with a safe fall surface, as required by the Department of Human Services, will be designed to meet pervious standards.
- 4. The City of Worthington Comprehensive Plan is the tool used to guide growth, redevelopment and improvements in Worthington; the land use map describes the use of property, enforces land use patterns, identifies places where change is needed, and set the form and location of future growth. Exhibit 1 D depicts the West Residential District from the Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map, and serves as a closer view of the property being considered for a conditional use permit.
  - i. The subject area under consideration current land use map is public-semi public; the surrounding land uses include public-semi public, and single family residential.
  - ii. The Comprehensive Plan provides direction for evaluation to review a variety of private and public projects. The evaluation requires using a series of questions to consider the merits of a project, which include:
    - 1. Is the project consistent with the Comprehensive Plan?
      - a. This addresses size, parking, and traffic. The location of the proposed child care facility would be consistent with the neighborhood as a service for Worthington families and would result in a gathering location for children adjacent to other gathering locations such as the playground to the north and the grade school to the south east. For the proposed facility, the Zoning Code requires 1:1 parking for employees as well as one loading space; there will be 35 employees, the site plan provides for 37 passenger car parking spaces and one loading space.
      - b. The project will generate some traffic on Pleasant Street, use of four 27 passenger buses will be the primary form of transportation for the children and parents brought to the proposed facility for early childhood educational opportunities. The project has adjusted the site plans to allow for movement of the buses and safe drop-off and pick up of the children with off-street stacking for four buses and 18 passenger cars. This was designed to mitigate potential concerns of traffic stacking on to Pleasant Street during peak traffic generating times (8 am Heartstart classroom start time and 3 pm based on 7 hour class or 4 pm on current release and departure).
      - c. Hours of operation are anticipated to be: Daytime Monday 8 am to 4:30 pm Teacher and Staff development as well as some guardian/child socialization classes normally 2 hours in duration; Tuesday Friday 8 am to 3 or 4 pm Early childhood education children usually 3-4 years of age; Staff Monday Friday typical hours 7:30 am to 5:30 pm. Evening Activities: Family night 3 to 5 times per month this supports the education of the family 5 pm to 9 pm; about 68 people plus staff and Policy Council –on to two times per month approximately 21-34 people. Occasional weekend activites.
    - 2. Does the project move Worthington towards its vision for the future? The West Residential District has a unique mixed use environment with parks, public use and residential neighborhoods, which provides for a balance between community-oriented uses accessible through the street network and sustainable

- residential neighborhoods. Pleasant Street serves as a feeder street to access to  $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$  Avenue SW, a functionally classified major collector and South Shore Drive (a collector street in the Comprehensive Plan). A child care facility does provide for a mixed use environment and is proposed to be located near an elementary school, a gathering place for children.
- 3. Is the project consistent with the policies contained in the Plan? The framework for community development incorporates population with jobs (Business growth and retention) (Exhibit 1E). It incorporates three main elements: local government services, housing and the demand for goods and services. Child Care use is a service that supports the population of workers of the jobs in Worthington; just as important, it is one of the factors that makes Worthington a desirable place to live, and as such is consistent with the polices of the Comprehensive Plan.

5. With each zoning application submitted, staff reviews compliance with all the applicable zoning regulations. A comparison of the proposed and Worthington Code is below:

The Planning Commission is to consider the Comprehensive Plan, possible adverse effects of the proposed conditional use and what additional requirements may be necessary to reduce such adverse effects.




Exhibit | E . Framework for community development




Figure 8-1 Framework for Community Development

## #2 School District Conditional Use Permit amendment request.

Background: Worthington ISD #518 is seeking to amend their Conditional Use Permit to remove two tracts from their original CUP which will reflect parts that have been or are to be developed differently from the original CUP (Exhibit 2A). The Zoning in this District is R"-1" — Single Family Detached. The legal description of the subject property under consideration is presented in Exhibit 2A-page 2, and is the description in the original CUP; Exhibit 2B is the description of the property to be removed. Exhibit 2C provides a map of the two areas under consideration for the amended CUP.

## Considerations:

There are two tracts that should be retracted or removed from the CUP.

Tract 1: is the property for the Headstart facility and is contingent upon approval of a CUP for the Headstart facility to be permitted as a child care conditional use.

Tract 2: is now part of the Church site in the NE corner of 1<sup>st</sup> Ave SW and Knollwood which was not removed when the church was granted a CUP and can be correct at this time.

## C. Conclusion

The original CUP should be amended to reflect parts that have been or about to be developed different than the original CUP.

Staff would recommend the amendment of the Conditional Use Permit to reflect the two tracts identified under considerations with the contingency identified.


